Geraldine's ANZAC ceremonies make national television

Geraldine was well and truly put on the map this Anzac Day with Television One's *Seven Sharp* team spending the day filming in and around the township. They were acting on a tip-off from the Geraldine RSA who thinks Geraldine's family duo of Hayden and Annalise Nelson is unique throughout the country.

Hayden has been playing the *Last Post* at the ANZAC services for the last five years and this was the third year Annalise has been asked to lead the singing of the national anthem.

Playing the *Last Post* is very special for sixteen-year-old Hayden because he and his grandfather Bill Nelson had both played the stirring ode at ANZAC services as 12-year-olds, 75 years apart. It's a long and grueling day with four ANZAC services through the day at Geraldine, Woodbury, Peel Forest and Rangitata, but Hayden thinks it's worth it.

"I feel it's a privilege to be able to honour those service people and the wider community. It's a bit of a challenge and I do get a bit nervous but I really enjoy the experience."

Singing in public is nothing new for 21-year-old Annalise Nelson who is in the last year of her performing arts degree at the National Academy of Singing and Dramatic Art in Christchurch. Annalise says being asked to sing *God Defend New Zealand* in her home town is an honour.

"Geraldine holds a very special place in my heart, so it's great to be able to come home and lead the national anthem."

Being filmed for television was a new experience for the siblings whose day started at 7.15am when they met the presenter and cameraman at the Talbot Street Cenotaph. Hayden reckons he gets nervous enough trying to play the *Last Post* well and the presence of the television camera added a whole new level of stress.

"Once I got the Geraldine service out of the way it got a lot easier. It was actually very interesting seeing the whole filming process in action; how they can spend all day and end up with a two-minute item on the news."

Coming to Geraldine produced an extra bonus for TV One presenter Mike Holland: he found Esther Paddon in the Geraldine ANZAC service crowd only hours after her grandson, Hayden, had become the first New Zealander to win a World Rally Championship round. Esther was "over the moon" after sitting up in the early hours to watch Hayden's nail-biting win. She told Mike Holland she danced around the house and celebrated with an ice-cream sundae.

ANZAC in Action wows big crowds

ANZAC in Action 2016 was a “great success” says event organiser Janene Adams. The event which attracted up to 5000 people from around the region over the weekend aims to commemorate World War 1 through re-enactments, displays, rides and entertainment.

Noisy battle re-enactments vied for attention with vintage car and traction engine rides as families enjoyed the sights, sounds and smells of early 1900’s life and war at the two-day event. Re-enactment group HQ 44 South thrilled the crowds with their authentic portrayal of battles on the Gallipoli Peninsula as well as giving people the opportunity to walk through life-sized replica trenches.

Seamus the Woodbury donkey walked among the crowds

with his period-dressed handler letting people pat him and take photos. Rangitata Aerodrome’s Tiger Moth and a Fokker D7 plane zoomed through the blue skies around the event.

Janene says: “People were thrilled to see the return of our poppy field with over 4,000 handmade poppies constructed by Diana O’Connell and complemented by a variety of artistic crosses created by the Geraldine Floral Art Group. Many took the opportunity for a few moments of quiet reflection among the poppies.”

Timaru entertainers, The Drama Queens, celebrated their two-year anniversary as they performed in the sunshine on Sunday, telling the crowd that they had formed especially for the event in 2014 and loved it so much that they continued

on as a group, singing favourite war songs.

Geraldine ANZAC Commemoration Trust chairman Max Millar says that the organising committee had already received many positive comments from families who attended. Fiona Wilcox of Geraldine, said that her family had not only had an amazing amount of fun but that the event had prompted a variety of interesting conversations among the family about war and sacrifice, which she felt had expanded their understanding considerably. Max says that this sort of experience is exactly the aim of the Trust and is pleased that the public enjoyed the event.

GROW YOUR OWN: Swales for efficient water use

If you want to grow great crops all year round without the need for time-consuming watering, then swales are a good option. They're simply a ditch engineered to capture water, retain it for longer, move it around if need be and slowly release it into the surrounding soil.

Swales are usually dug on a level contour, enabling the water to stay put before seeping into the surrounding soil. Or, for wet sections swales can be engineered horizontally across a slight slope with materials (bricks for example) at either end to hold the water, then allow it move it on when it reaches a particular capacity.

Some keen gardeners in Geraldine have engineered swales with great success; their plants have good access to water when required, resulting in less-stressed plants and a healthier and more vibrant garden. Some swales are left as a ditch; others are filled in using mulch such as woodchip so the swale can still be walked over. Using woodchip as the mulch filler gives the added benefit of enhancing the microbial life within the soil – fungi in particular.

Water use is highly efficient when using swales. On sloping sections, rain water quickly flows down the land and away. Install a swale and the movement of water slows down, increasing water efficiency, reducing run-off and degradation of top soil and assisting greatly with plant growth. How much water is retained and for how long depends on a number of factors including soil type, slope and how the swale is engineered.

Take a look at your land, where does it slope? Are there very wet or dry areas that could benefit from a swale? If I was beginning an entirely new garden, a swale is the first thing I would engineer.

Swales can be as simple or complex as you like – it depends on your situation – from a simple ditch (dug to a spade depth) dug on a level contour, to a more complex large scale series of swales, dug out using a digger, that could also utilise storm water (check with local council).

Fortnightly tasks

- Sow broad beans and hardy winter veges such as pak choy.
- Keep an eye out for wild mushrooms to harvest: check they are safe for eating first.

- Place fallen leaves on compost heaps or around fruit trees, perennials and berries to help promote a flush of fungi.
- If your ground needs nourishment, there are plenty of options including sowing oats or barley for green manures

to dig in in spring, dig in manure and plenty of compost or brew some aerated compost tea and pour directly on the garden, including foliage.

Debut WRC victory for Hayden Paddon in Argentina

Kiwi rally drivers Hayden Paddon and John Kennard made history with their victory at Rally Argentina. They are the first New Zealanders to win a round of the FIA World Rally Championship.

Hayden delivered the drive of his life on the very last challenge of the rally – the mountainous El Condor special stage – to wrench the rally victory from three-time WRC champion Sébastien Ogier on Sunday afternoon.

Hayden, originally from Geraldine, now holds second place in the WRC drivers' championship with 57 points to Ogier's 96. This is also the highest-ever championship position for a Kiwi rally driver and raises the possibility of his becoming Geraldine's next world champion.

Hayden and John started Sunday's final three-stage leg of Rally Argentina with a lead of 29.8 seconds over second-placed Ogier. The first fog-affected run through El Condor saw Ogier take 7.4 seconds out of Hayden's lead as he lost precious seconds with a gear-change issue. Special stage 17 saw Ogier deliver a blistering run which cut Hayden's lead to a mere 2.6 seconds with just the final power stage to go. Hayden stood up to the Frenchman's challenge, saying he "drove the wheels off" his new generation Hyundai i20 car to secure his first power stage win and also his debut WRC rally win.

"It's an amazing feeling, to win like this, on the last stage where the odds were a little bit against us," said Hayden at the rally finish. "We lost a lot of time in the previous stage and just over two seconds margin going into that last one – I didn't have a lot of confidence, but we just pushed like hell. We've worked a lot on that stage in the three weeks before the rally because I've not been particularly strong on the tight and twisty stages. It's a fantastic result for me, John and the whole team. A huge amount of work has gone into the New Generation i20 WRC. I knew from the first test that we could win with it, I just didn't quite expect it to be so soon. I'm sure it's the start of a lot more to come. I'm thankful to everyone



who has supported us back home in New Zealand and for all the positive messages we've received this weekend."

The event victory gives Hayden's team, Hyundai Motorsport, its first win in a gravel event. It's also the first win in the new generation Hyundai i20 WRC car in only its fourth outing.

Andy Sinclair, Hyundai New Zealand general manager, said he was rapt to see Hayden and John on the top of the podium in Argentina. "Congratulations to Hayden and John on a truly outstanding performance to secure their first-ever WRC rally victory," said Andy.

"We've had the great pleasure of working with Hayden since he secured his contract with Hyundai Motorsport. His talent, professionalism and determination shine through in everything he does – he and John work incredibly hard and this success is surely just the start."

Prior to the next WRC round in Portugal, Paddon and Kennard fly back to New Zealand to compete in the International Rally of Whangarei in the New Zealand-built Hyundai i20 rally car in which they secured an astounding record-breaking win at Rally Otago the week before Argentina."



"It's a delightful comedy; hugely funny – beautifully crafted in terms of the development of character and plot, with memorable lines," says Kay Paterson, director of Oscar Wilde's masterpiece, *The Importance of Being Earnest*. "It's worthy of putting on and has been since its first performance in 1895 in London."

The Importance of Being Earnest is an English favourite with its plot circularity and symmetry, froth and "earnestness" and paradoxical rhetoric. Geraldine Academy of Performance and Arts students are bringing it to local audiences.

The project is "ambitious", Kay says, but the young actors were ready for it. "We did *Hamlet* last year and I knew how capable these kids were. I've worked with a number of them over several years; the groundwork's done. It makes a demanding play possible. There are four really big roles. People will be very impressed with what they all do."

The actors understand the essential thespian skill of sliding under a character's skin, and transforming into that character, even in a role that is initially alien. Taylor Scott, playing Dr Chasuble, says, "At the start I wasn't too sure about the character of Chasuble. It wasn't a persona I was familiar with acting... I feel that I've become what I see Chasuble to be like."

Dylan Watkins fell into an easy rapport with his character. "I have enjoyed getting to know Algernon over the past few weeks of rehearsal... I love most, if not all, my lines, because they are funny and smart."

And playing Cecily Cardew has been "a wonderful

experience" for Eilish Walter. "Her viewpoints on men and life are most hilarious. I can very much relate to Cecily in dreaming off in class. I feel after the production, Cecily and I will still continue to be good friends."

The production is anchored firmly in the Victorian period, "because that setting makes sense for the characters' behaviour", explains Kay.

Costume designer Sheryl Thompson says the wardrobe has been created and refined "to catch the feel of the time and help the actors fill the roles. The more detail and textural aid you can bring, the more believable the costumes are."

"All the aspects of putting on a play have to be as strong as each other." A contemporaneous three-setting stage design by Max Paterson completes the production's recreation of a late-Victorian world.

Producer Jill Roberts says, "It's part of the Academy's vision to be promoting and supporting high quality plays in our area. To have something of this calibre by our youth in this town is really exciting. I hope people will see how much fun classical theatre can be."

The Importance of Being Earnest is at the Lodge Theatre, 6, 7 and 14 May at 7pm, with a matinee on 15 May at 2pm. A cucumber sandwich and teacake supper will be served between the second and third acts for a donation. Tickets are \$16/\$10 at Just One Wish (Berry Barn complex). Introduction to the Health and Safety at Work Act: What's new (2 of 3)

The new Health and Safety at Work Act came into force on 4 April. In this article, WorkSafe New Zealand outlines some of the key changes in the new law.

The Health and Safety at Work Act is built around the simple idea that businesses need to identify health and safety risks and find sensible ways to make things safer. That idea – of eliminating or managing risks – is not new, but the act includes some new features.

It makes health and safety everyone's responsibility, while recognising that a business has more influence and control than its workers. It starts at the top with the board of directors and chief executive. It is not acceptable for directors to sit back passively and assume health and safety is being taken care of further down the chain of command.

Company officers (usually directors and the chief executive) must perform due diligence – they must ensure their business puts proper health and safety policies in place and that it has enough resources to make those policies work. They also need to make sure those policies are being used in practice, for example, by getting regular reports on health and safety.

That does not automatically mean the director of a building company will be in the firing line if someone is injured because a scaffold collapses, but they might be if they didn't ensure the business had a proper process in place for managing the risk of working at height.

The new law also encourages co-operation – between businesses working on the same site, between contractors and sub-contractors and between workers and managers. The law is designed to encourage everyone involved at a worksite to talk to each other about health and safety and make sure risks are being managed.

The new law introduces a requirement on all businesses to engage with their workers on health and safety matters. It doesn't set in stone what form that engagement must take – that will vary from industry to industry and business to business. But the law is clear: if it relates to health and safety then there needs to be meaningful discussion with workers.

For larger businesses (with 20 or more workers) or those in high-risk industries, there are some additional requirements. If one or more workers request a health and safety representative (HSR) an election must be held. And, if an HSR, or five or more workers, ask for a health and safety committee (HSC) then the business must formally consider that request.

Any law change naturally creates some uncertainty but health and safety does not have to be complicated. So do your research now. Review your current health and safety set-up. Talk to your staff and your colleagues about staying healthy and safe at work. Make a start today.

The Geraldine News contacted WorkSafe Timaru office asking for a comment or for some data about safety in workplaces in the Geraldine or South Canterbury district. WorkSafe has an inspector based in Timaru whose territory includes Geraldine. As the paper went to print we had not heard from WorkSafe - the inspector was unable to speak to the media and her manager had not made contact with us.

A word from the chair: Healthy catchments a focus for your zone committee

As the new Chair of the Orari-Temuka-Opihi-Pareora (OTOP) Zone Committee I am excited about my increased involvement as I believe the committee is a great forum to deliver the community’s aspirations for local water.

As well as a new chair, we also have two new members; Ivon Hurst and Hamish McFarlane. Both bring an excellent knowledge of farming and experience in working collaboratively to resolve complex issues.

As a committee, we are getting to grips with the OTOP Healthy Catchments Project. The project provides a special opportunity to ‘sort our water’ and extra resource will be provided to the zone.

The project requires us to enhance our understanding of the current state of play in the zone so each month we are focussing on a different topic.

At our last meeting we considered how plans address water quantity and why and how minimum flows and allocation limits are set in the Opihi catchment. We also talked about how the Opuha system is managed in times of low rainfall, and noted that an adaptive approach can bring benefits.

In May we are expecting an update on recent research on cyanobacteria, which has become a problem in many of our local waterways.

Our meetings are open to the public and provide opportunities for you to share your views and concerns.

Healthy Catchments Project

This year the OTOP Zone Committee will work with the community to address local water quality and quantity challenges and you have an opportunity to get involved.

Many waterways in the zone have water quality and quantity issues and as demand for water continues and the effects of land use become apparent, more pressure is placed on the resource.

The ‘Healthy Catchments Project’ is an opportunity for you to share local knowledge and have a say on how water management can be improved.

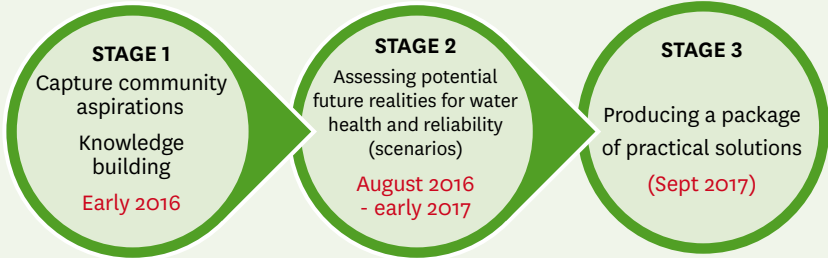
Over the coming year the OTOP Zone Committee will work with the community to develop a package of practical solutions including:

OTOP Zone Committee visits local dairy farm with a close eye on sustainability



In March the OTOP Zone Committee went on a field trip to build its understanding of the local water resource.

The committee visited Craigmores Farming’s Pareora dairy farm to find out about some of the work being done on-farm to protect and enhance water quality.

Farm manager Colin Muir said when the property was converted to dairy in 2012/13 the team proactively organised to meet with neighbours and Environment Canterbury staff.

“We appreciate we are farming in a sensitive area with freshwater streams running through our property so we were keen to share our vision for sustainable farming with the community. We welcome contact with our neighbours and visits from schools.

“Craigmores farms are all managed in line with a set of nine sustainability principles, which are displayed on our farm-shed walls. The principles relate to things like protecting biodiversity values, and soil and water quality.

“All of our staff are trained in irrigation and effluent management, and water quality and soil moisture are monitored regularly during irrigation season so that we only apply the water that will stay in the soil”.

“OVERSEER® is also used to manage the application of nutrients and maximise on-farm productivity, while minimising nutrient run-off into the streams,” he said.

More than 2,500 native trees have been planted to help prevent nutrient runoff into streams and to increase the biodiversity values on the farm.

Extensive fencing has been undertaken with margins of up to 30m in some places and the subsequent improvements in water quality has seen eels return to the waterway.
